ABOUT THE FACULTY

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services has launched numerous initiatives to help health care providers achieve large-scale transformation, including moving from volume-based health care to value-based, patient-centered health care. Among them is the Transforming Clinical Practice Initiative (TCPI), which supports more than 140,000 clinicians nationwide in sharing, adapting, and further developing comprehensive quality improvement strategies. The initiative is part the Affordable Care Act and is aimed at:

- Promoting broad payment and practice reform in primary care and specialty care,
- Promoting care coordination between providers of services and suppliers,
- Establishing community-based health teams to support chronic care management, and
- Promoting improved quality and reduced cost by developing a collaborative of institutions that support practice transformation.

There are 41 networks participating in TCPI—including Compass PTN, which is administered by the Iowa Healthcare Collaborative. Compass PTN serves clinicians in Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, South Dakota, and Wisconsin.

The Kansas Healthcare Collaborative (KHC) is the state lead for Compass PTN. Currently 240 practices are participating in the Kansas network. KHC is a provider-led 501(c)3 organization with a mission to transform health care through patient-centered initiatives that improve quality, safety, and value. Founded in 2008 by the Kansas Hospital Association and the Kansas Medical Society, KHC embodies the commitment of these two provider groups to act as a resource and continuously enhance the quality of care provided to Kansans. Tom Evans, MD

Compass Practice Transformation Network, President and CEO

Dr. Evans practiced family medicine for 13 years and served as chief medical officer for UnityPoint Health in Des Moines, Iowa. He has served on the board for the National Patient Safety Foundation and on the delegations for both the American Medical Association and the American Academy of Family Physicians. He served as president of both the Iowa Medical Society and the Iowa Academy of Family Physicians. Dr. Evans is a faculty member with the Institute for Healthcare Improvement, the College of Medicine at Des Moines University, and the College of Public Health at the University of Iowa.



Kirsten Meisinger, MD

Dr. Meisinger is Medical Staff President for the Cambridge Health Alliance (CHA), Regional Medical Director in Primary Care for CHA, and the CHA Site Visit Liaison. She has an active panel as a family practice physician at the Union Square Family Health Center, a CHA practice, and has been Medical Director of the site since 2008. She has served as National Faculty Co-Chair for the Transforming Clinical Practices Initiative. She has faculty appointments at Tufts University and Harvard Medical School and is the faculty lead of the Institute for Healthcare Improvement Latin American team. Dr. Meisinger earned a BA from Brown University, her medical degree from Case Western Reserve University, and completed a Family Medicine Residency at the Greater Lawrence Family Health Center in Lawrence, Massachusetts. She has a Master of Health Care Delivery Science from Dartmouth University.

Doug Patten, MD, FACS

Compass Practice Transformation Network, Physician Engagement Faculty

Dr. Patten is Associate Dean of the Medical College of Georgia, Southwest Campus at Augusta University. His clinical background is general surgery, practicing in rural southern Georgia, based in Cordele. He has been a physician leader at the regional level with Phoebe Putney Health System, at the state level with Georgia Hospital Association, and at the local level as a board member for Crisp Regional Hospital. He is also a co-founder of CCI, a startup technology platform designed to improve patient care through enhanced facilitation of patient transfers to the most appropriate site of care. He also serves on the boards of Healthcare Georgia Foundation and Albany Area Primary Health Care. Dr. Patten earned his medical degree from LSU School of Medicine in New Orleans and was trained in general surgery at University of South Florida in Tampa.

She also provided external quality review for Medicaid managed care behavioral health and substance abuse programs and served as Corporate Compliance Officer.



Eric Cook-Wiens, MPH, CPHQ

Kansas Healthcare Collaborative, Data and Measurement Director

Eric Cook-Wiens oversees data collection management and analysis for hospital- and clinic-based quality improvement efforts and provides training and technical assistance related to using data to support and drive quality improvement efforts. Prior to joining KHC, Cook-Wiens worked for the Kansas Department of Health and Environment where he served as advanced epidemiologist for the Diabetes Prevention Program and the Heart Disease and Stroke Prevention Program. He earned his Master of Public Health degree in General Epidemiology from the University of Michigan and undergraduate degree from Bethel College in North Newton. He is a Certified Professional in Healthcare Quality.

Community Health Center of Southeast Kansas – Pittsburg

The Community Health Center of Southeast Kansas (CHC/SEK) is a Federally Qualified Health Center dedicated to providing quality health care to everyone regardless of income or insurance status. CHC/SEK employs more than 300 professionals and support staff at 11 clinic sites in Crawford, Cherokee, Labette, Montgomery, and Allen Counties. CHC/SEK provides medical, dental, and behavioral health services to more than 40,000 patients annually.

Family Health Center – Lakin

Kearny County Hospital (KCH) is a full-spectrum frontier medical complex located in the small town of Lakin. The hospital provides primary care through five doctors and five mid-level providers at our Family Health Center, which is a designated rural health clinic, seeing patients from more than 12 counties in southwest Kansas.

Family Physicians of Kansas – Andover

Family Physicians of Kansas is an independent family practice clinic. The clinic supports three physicians—all certified by the American Board of Family Practice—and two physician assistants.

FreeState Health – Wichita

FreeState Health started as a group of doctors using modern technology to help isolated rural communities get access to affordable healthcare. Now, FreeState supports board-certified Internal Medicine and Pediatrics doctors with broad experience, plus some subspecialties.

McPherson Medical & Surgical Associates – McPherson

McPherson Medical & Surgical Associates is a group of nine physicians and four mid-level professionals offering a wide range of services and specialties. Areas of practice include family medicine, general surgery, and obstetrics and gynecology. Lab and radiologic services are readily available for patients within the facility. As a regional Medical Education Network site for the University of Kansas School of Medicine, our physicians and practitioners regularly mentor medical school students through targeted rural education rotation assignments.

Rush County Medical Clinic – La Crosse

Rush County Medical Clinic is a fully staffed Rural Health Clinic providing high quality services including outreach clinics for cardiology, behavioral health, vision, and podiatry. The medical providers specialize in family practice, women's health, and orthopedics.

Sunflower Ob-Gyn – Winfield

Sunflower Ob-Gyn strives to provide the best and most innovative healthcare for patients, with comprehensive, genuine, and compassionate care throughout the stages of a woman's life. The clinic offers a variety of services including well women care, low- and high-risk obstetrics, gynecological treatments, birth control options, sonography, and laparoscopic surgery options. Sunflower is proud to have a C-section rate less than 20 percent.
